MINUTES OF regular MEETING OF THE CITY COMMISSION
OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, HELD November 7, 1944
1944 AT .M.

On this the 7 day of November, A.D. 1944,
the City Commission of the City of Lufkin, Texas, convened in
regular session, in the regular meeting place in said

constituting a quorum when the following business was transacted:

Minutes of the meetings held during October were read and approved.

2. W. C. Green, representing the Kurth Memorial Library requested that the City increase it's monthly contribution to the Library, in order that they might have sufficient funds to properly carry on the Library service.

3. After discussion, motion was made by Arthur Temple, Jr, second by J. A. Abney and carried by unanimous vote, increasing the City's contribution to the Library from \$150.00 to \$200.00 with request that the Lufkin Independent School District be solicited for a contribution of as much as \$50.00 per month to the Library.

4. J. W. Fenley appeared on behalf of the application of F. W. Thomas for approval of a proposed Negro Sub-division, to be located south of Davis Street between Lake Street and Sayers Street.

5. The matter was discussed at length, and a petition signed by a number of white residents surrounding this property, and protesting against the sale of this property to Negroes, ~~was read~~ official action on this proposition was passed for later consideration.

6. Motion was made by D. M. Thrash, second by Arthur Temple, Jr., authorizing the City Manager to work out a plan for paving South Third Street, from Burke Avenue to Highway 69, provided the property owners will furnish additional right-a-way for 60 foot width.

7. Report was made of complaints ^{by people} living just inside the City Limits of an annoyance and damages to yards and gardens by live stock coming in, and suggestion was made that the pound pen penalty be increased as a possible means of getting owners to keep the live stock from running loose, but no definite action was taken.

No other business was presented, so the meeting adjourned.
