1. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Bob Klund, Believers Bible Church.
2. Mayor Jack Gorden welcomed visitors present. City Manager Paul Parker introduced Dale Allred, Director of Inspection Services who had recently joined the City of Lufkin staff.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Minutes of the Regular Meeting on May 15, 2007 were approved on a motion by Councilmember Lynn Torres, and seconded by Councilmember Rose Faine Boyd. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

NEW BUSINESS :

4. **FIRST READING OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, - APPROVED - BY GRANTING A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR AUTOMOBILE SALES WITHIN A LOCAL BUSINESS ZONING DISTRICT ON CERTAIN TRACTS OR PARCELS OF LAND WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS DESCRIBED AS LOT 1, BLOCK 18 OF THE LUFKIN LAND AND LUMBER COMPANY NUMBER 2 SUBDIVISION AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY PLANNER TO MAKE SUCH CHANGES ON THE OFFICIAL MAP**

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was to conduct a Public Hearing and consider on First Reading an Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by granting a Special Use Permit for Automobile Sales within a Local Business Zoning District on certain tracts or parcels of land within the corporate

limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas described as Lot 1, Block 18 of the Lufkin Land and Lumber Company Number 2 Subdivision and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the applicant All-Star Autos was proposing to make renovations to the existing building at 1205 East Denman Avenue to open an auto sales lot. City Manager Parker added that the general character of the area was “Retail” and “Commercial”, with multiple apartment complexes in the general vicinity along East Denman. City Manager Parker explained that the subject area had a “Local Business” zoning designation and a “Retail” future land use classification. City Manager Parker stated that an existing sales lot currently existed adjacent to the subject property at 1207 East Denman Avenue. City Manager Parker added that the Planning Department and the Planning and Zoning Commission both recommended that the Council approve the proposed “Special Use” permit.

Mayor Gorden then opened the Public Hearing at 5:12 p.m. Mayor Gorden asked those attending the Council Meeting if there was anyone who wanted to speak concerning the amendment. Melissa Butler, owner of All-Star Auto, came to the podium and thanked the Council for their time and their consideration of the “Special Use” permit. Ms. Butler stated that she would be happy to answer any questions that the Council had concerning the permit. There were none. Mayor Gorden then closed the Public Hearing at 5:13 p.m.

Councilmember Rufus Duncan moved to approve the First Reading of the Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by granting a Special Use Permit for Automobile Sales within a Local Business Zoning District on certain tracts or parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas described as Lot 1, Block 18 of the Lufkin Land and Lumber Company Number 2 Subdivision and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map. Councilmember Lynn Torres seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

5. FIRST READING OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, - APPROVED - BY GRANTING A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR A TELECOMMUNICATION TOWER WITHIN A COMMERCIAL ZONING DISTRICT ON CERTAIN TRACTS OR PARCELS OF LAND WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, DESCRIBED AS TRACT 66 OF THE J. L. QUINALTY SURVEY, ABSTRACT 40 AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY PLANNER TO MAKE SUCH CHANGES ON THE OFFICIAL MAP

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was to conduct a Public Hearing and consider on First Reading an Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by granting a Special Use Permit for a Telecommunication Tower within a Commercial Zoning District on certain tracts or parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas, described as Tract 66 of the J. L. Quinalty Survey, Abstract 40 and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the applicant, DP Solutions, was proposing to construct a one hundred ninety (190) foot self supporting tower. City Manager Parker added that the tower would be equipped with antennas to provide enhanced communication services. City Manager Parker stated that the general character of the area was “Business” and “Retail” and the subject area had a “Commercial” zoning designation with a “Commercial” future land use classification. City Manager Parker explained that the properties to the north and east were businesses, with the properties to the south and west being residences. City Manager Parker stated that the Planning Department did not anticipate any noticeable impact on the land use with the “Special Use” request. City Manager Parker added that the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of the proposed “Special Use” permit.

Mayor Gorden then opened the Public Hearing at 5:15 p.m. Mayor Gorden asked those attending the Council Meeting if there was anyone who wanted to speak concerning the “Special Use” permit. There were none. Mayor Gorden then closed the Public Hearing at 5:16 p.m.

Councilmember Rose Faine Boyd moved to approve the First Reading of the Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by granting a Special Use Permit for a Telecommunication Tower within a Commercial Zoning District on certain tracts or parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas, described as Tract 66 of the J. L. Quinalty Survey, Abstract 40 and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map. Councilmember Phil Medford seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

6. FIRST READING OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE AND THE FUTURE LAND USE PLAN OF THE 2001 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, - APPROVED - BY CHANGING THE ZONING AND FUTURE LAND USE PLAN DESIGNATION ON APPROXIMATELY 3.8 ACRES OF LAND DESCRIBED AS TRACTS 3.4, 3.2.46, 3.2.66 OF THE J. A. BONTON SURVEY, ABSTRACT 5 TO DUPLEX ZONING DISTRICT AND THE FUTURE LAND USE PLAN OF THE 2001 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TO THE CLASSIFICATION OF MEDIUM DENSITY RESIDENTIAL

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was to conduct a Public Hearing and consider on First Reading an Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance and the Future Land Use Plan of the 2001 Comprehensive Plan of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by changing the Zoning and Future Land Use Plan designation on approximately 3.8 acres of land described as Tracts 3.4, 3.2.46, 3.2.66 of the J. A. Bonton Survey, Abstract 5 to Duplex Zoning District and the Future Land Use Plan of the 2001 Comprehensive Plan to the classification of Medium Density Residential.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the applicant, Aaron Davis, was requesting a zone change from “Residential Large” to “Duplex” on 3.8 acres of land on Old Union Road. City Manager Parker added that the general vicinity of the area proposed for rezoning was a mix of “Residential Large”, “Duplex”, and “Commercial” zoning. City Manager Parker stated that the Planning Staff along with the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of both the zone change and the future land use change.

Mayor Gorden then opened the Public Hearing at 5:18 p.m. Mayor Gorden asked those attending the Council Meeting if there was anyone who wanted to speak concerning the “Special Use” permit. There were none. Mayor Gorden then closed the Public Hearing at 5:19 p.m.

Councilmember Phil Medford moved to approve the First Reading of the Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance and the Future Land Use Plan of the 2001 Comprehensive Plan of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by changing the Zoning and Future Land Use Plan designation on approximately 3.8 acres of land described as Tracts 3.4, 3.2.46, 3.2.66 of the J. A. Bonton Survey, Abstract 5 to Duplex Zoning District and the Future Land Use Plan of the 2001 Comprehensive Plan to the classification of Medium Density Residential. Councilmember Lynn Torres seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

7. FIRST READING OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, - APPROVED - BY CHANGING THE ZONING DESIGNATION OF A CERTAIN TRACT OR PARCEL OF LAND WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF LUFKIN, TEXAS, DESCRIBED AS TRACT 6 OF THE H. H. BROOKSHER SURVEY, ABSTRACT 127 FROM THE ZONING CLASSIFICATION OF RESIDENTIAL MEDIUM TO COMMERCIAL ZONING DISTRICT AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY PLANNER TO MAKE SUCH CHANGES ON THE OFFICIAL MAP

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was to conduct a Public Hearing and consider on First Reading an Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by changing the Zoning designation of a certain tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas, described as Tract 6 of the H. H. Brooksher Survey, Abstract 127 from the zoning classification of Residential Medium to Commercial Zoning District and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the applicant, William Royle, who was requesting that 4.4 acres, more commonly known, as 2515 Atkinson Drive be rezoned to the “Commercial” classification. City Manager Parker added that Mr. Royle was included in the recent annexation of one hundred forty-eight (148) acres located to the North of the subject property. City Manager Parker explained that there was four (4) small residential homes currently on the property. City Manager Parker stated that the applicant was asking that the property be rezoned “Commercial” to match the remainder of the property that was rezoned with the annexation.

Mayor Gorden then opened the Public Hearing at 5:19 p.m. Mayor Gorden asked those attending the Council Meeting if there was anyone who wanted to speak concerning the “Special Use” permit. There were none. Mayor Gorden then closed the Public Hearing at 5:20 p.m.

Councilmember Lynn Torres moved to approve the First Reading of the Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Lufkin, Texas, by changing the Zoning designation of a certain tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City of Lufkin, Texas, described as Tract 6 of the H. H. Brooksher Survey, Abstract 127 from the zoning classification of Residential Medium to Commercial Zoning District and authorizing the City Planner to make such changes on the Official Map. Councilmember Don Langston seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

8. FIRST READING OF AN ORDINANCE ELECTING FOR THE CITY TO MAKE CURRENT SERVICE AND PRIOR SERVICE CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE CITY’S ACCOUNT IN THE MUNICIPAL ACCUMULATION FUND OF THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM – APPROVED - AT THE ACTUARIALLY DETERMINED RATE OF TOTAL EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was the First Reading of an Ordinance electing for the City to make current service and prior service contributions to the City’s account in the Municipal Accumulation Fund of the Texas Municipal Retirement System at the actuarially determined rate of total employee compensation.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the maximum contribution rate in the Texas Municipal Retirement System was fourteen percent (14%). City Manager Parker explained that the Ordinance would allow the City to continue matching the current approved level, which was fourteen point zero one percent (14.01%). City Manager Parker added that the Ordinance would allow the City to continue the present funding level in future years if there was a fluctuation.

Mayor Gorden asked if the change would carry over to future years. City Manager Parker explained that it would carry over, but that Staff would bring back any changes to the Council in the future.

Councilmember R. L. Kuykendall moved to approve the First Reading of the Ordinance electing for the City to make current service and prior service contributions to the City’s account in the Municipal Accumulation Fund of the Texas Municipal Retirement System at the actuarially determined rate of total employee compensation. Councilmember Rose Faine Boyd seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

9. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN AMENDMENT TO THE 2006/2007 OPERATING BUDGET (BUDGET AMENDMENT NO. 24). - APPROVED - PROVIDING FOR THE SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS IN THE GENERAL FUND; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF A GRANT FROM THE REGIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL (RAC) FOR FUNDS TOTALING \$15,248 TO PURCHASE EMS EQUIPMENT FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was a Resolution authorizing an amendment to the 2006/2007 Operating Budget (Budget Amendment No. 24), providing for the supplemental appropriation of funds in the General Fund; and providing an effective date and authorizing the acceptance of a grant from the Regional Advisory Council (RAC) for funds totaling \$15,248 to purchase EMS equipment for the Fire Department.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that this was a budget adjustment where the City was adding money from a grant source. City Manager Parker added that the Regional Advisory Council (RAC) had awarded the Fire Department fifteen thousand two hundred forty-eight dollars (\$15,248). City Manager Parker explained that the Fire Department anticipated using the grant for a Stryker hydraulic stretcher, an Intubation Head, and a Panasonic Tough Book Computer. City Manager Parker added that there was no match required for the grant.

Councilmember Don Langston moved to approve the Resolution authorizing an amendment to the 2006/2007 Operating Budget (Budget Amendment No. 24), providing for the supplemental appropriation of funds in the General Fund; and providing an effective date and authorizing the acceptance of a grant from the Regional Advisory Council (RAC) for funds totaling \$15,248 to purchase EMS equipment for the Fire Department.. Councilmember Rose Faine Boyd seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

10. SALE OF THE FORFEITED HOUSE – APPROVED - AT 209 AUGUST STREET

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was the sale of the forfeited house at 209 August Street.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that this was a forfeiture house at 209 August Street that was awarded to the Lufkin Police Department and the District Attorney's Office. City Manager Parker added that the previous agreement with the Lufkin Home Builders Association was that the Police Department would receive one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to later be divided with the County. City Manager Parker stated that the Lufkin Home Builders Association would receive any money in excess of the one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to use for their work with Habitat for Humanity. City Manager Parker stated that the Home Builders did a tremendous amount of work on the house and made it a really nice upgraded home. City Manager Parker explained that Police Chief Larry Brazil was contacted by Melvin Linton, a representative of the Home Builders Association, requesting the Police Department to take two thousand dollars (\$2,000) less than was originally agreed upon which would come to ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$98,000). City Manager Parker stated that Chief Brazil was in agreement with that amount. City Manager Parker added that in addition there were back taxes and other expenses that would be deducted from the amount the Police Department would receive. City Manager Parker explained that after all of the expenses the remainder of the funds would be split between the Police Department and the District Attorney's Office with the Lufkin Police Department receiving seventy percent (70%) and the District Attorney's Office receiving thirty percent (30%). City Manager Parker stated that the Lufkin Police Chief Larry Brazil recommended that the Council approve the sale of the forfeiture house at 209 August Street, with the Lufkin Police Department and the District Attorney's Office share being ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$98,000) less any taxes or related expenses.

Mayor Jack Gorden commented that the house was a great example of people working together to take a bad deal and make it good and that all involved were to be commended.

Councilmember Rufus Duncan moved to approve the sale of the forfeited house at 209 August Street. Councilmember Don Langston seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

11. AUTHORIZATION TO AWARD A CONTRACT WITH DAVID PARKER FOR A FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR A CIVIC/CONVENTION/SHELTER CENTER - APPROVED - AND TO EXPEND AWARDED GRANT MONIES ALREADY ALLOCATED TO "PROFESSIONAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES" ACCORDING TO THE GRANT FUNDING BREAKDOWN IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$38,500

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was to award a contract with David Parker for a feasibility study for a Civic/Convention/Shelter Center and to expend awarded grant monies already allocated to "professional and administrative services" according to the grant funding breakdown in an amount not to exceed \$38,500.

City Manager Paul Parker stated the City of Lufkin had been looking at the feasibility of a Convention Center/Shelter for quite some time. City Manager Parker added that the recent Rita and Katrina Hurricanes had made the shelter needs very well known. City Manager Parker added that the City of Lufkin had also looked at the possibility of a Convention Center. City Manager Parker stated that a committee had studied the feasibility of combination center for Lufkin. City Manager Parker stated that David Parker had looked at numerous studies and had made numerous recommendations concerning such facilities. City Manager Parker stated that the committee had previously visited with Mr. Parker and were of the consensus that Mr. Parker would give an unbiased opinion. City Manager Parker stated that the City of Lufkin could spend thirty-eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$38,500) from the grant which was two hundred ninety-seven thousand dollars (\$297,000) and was received through Senator Hutchison's office. City Manager Parker added that there would be no out-of-pocket money spent from the local taxpayers. City Manager Parker stated that Staff recommended that the City Council enter into a contract with DP Consulting, in an amount not to exceed thirty-eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$38,500) with thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) for the study and three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) as a ten percent (10%) expense contingency to perform a feasibility study for a Convention/Shelter Center.

Councilmember Don Langston moved to award a contract with David Parker for a feasibility study for a Civic/Convention/Shelter Center and to expend awarded grant monies already allocated to "professional and administrative services" according to the grant funding breakdown in an amount not to exceed \$38,500. Councilmember Lynn Torres seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

12. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN AMENDMENT TO THE 2006/2007 OPERATING BUDGET (BUDGET AMENDMENT NO. 25), - APPROVED - PROVIDING FOR THE SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS IN THE GENERAL FUND; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND ACCEPTANCE OF A GRANT FROM DETCOG IN THE AMOUNT OF \$54,636 AND AUTHORIZE THE LUFKIN POLICE DEPARTMENT TO USE THE GRANT FOR EQUIPMENT FOR THE COMMUNICATION CENTER IN THE AMOUNT OF \$26,515.65

Mayor Jack Gorden stated that the next item for consideration was a Resolution authorizing an amendment to the 2006/2007 Operating Budget (Budget Amendment No. 25), providing for the supplemental appropriation of funds in the General Fund; and providing an effective date and acceptance of a grant from DETCOG in the amount of \$54,636 and authorize the Lufkin Police Department to use the grant for equipment for the Communication Center in the amount of \$26,515.65.

City Manager Paul Parker stated that the Lufkin Police Department Communication Center was the largest 9-1-1 Center in the DETCOG Region. City Manager Parker added that when the 9-1-1 funds received by DETCOG exceeded their expenses, the balance was available to the largest communication center in the area, which was the City of Lufkin. City Manager Parker stated that the City of Lufkin was granted fifty-four thousand six hundred thirty-six dollars (\$54,636) in excess funds. City Manager Parker stated that the Police Department was requesting to use a portion of those funds to purchase an additional radio console for the Communication Center. City Manager Parker explained that the City currently had four (4) work stations with only two (2) having radio consoles. City Manager Parker added that there were three (3) work stations manned by communication operators and the additional console would allow the third operator to assist with related duties, but would also improve radio communications between shared channels by one communications operator. City Manager Parker stated that the cost of the additional radio console was twenty-one thousand nine hundred twenty-five dollars and sixty-five cents (\$21,925.65). City Manager Parker stated that the second item that would be purchased was two (2) Profile System 24/7 dispatch chairs in the amount of four thousand five hundred ninety dollars (\$4,590). City Manager Parker explained that the specialty chairs were designed for long periods of use and were adjustable to meet the physical requirements of different individuals. City Manager Parker added that the total cost of the console and chairs was twenty-six thousand five hundred fifteen dollars and sixty-five cents (\$26,515.65). City Manager Parker stated that the remaining balance in the amount of twenty-eight thousand one hundred twenty dollars and thirty-five cents (\$28,120.35) would be allocated to the general fund un-obligated fund balance.

Councilmember Rose Faine Boyd moved to approve the Resolution authorizing an amendment to the 2006/2007 Operating Budget (Budget Amendment No. 25), providing for the supplemental appropriation of funds in the General Fund; and providing an effective date and acceptance of a grant from DETCOG in the amount of \$54,636 and authorize the Lufkin Police Department to use the grant for equipment for the Communication Center in the amount of \$26,515.65. Councilmember Don Langston seconded the motion. A unanimous affirmative vote was recorded.

13. Mayor Jack Gorden recessed the Regular Session at 5:32 p.m. to enter into Executive Session.

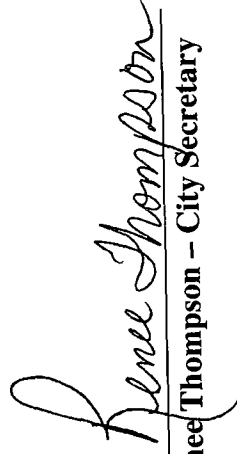
Mayor Jack Gorden reconvened the Regular Session at 7:20 p.m.

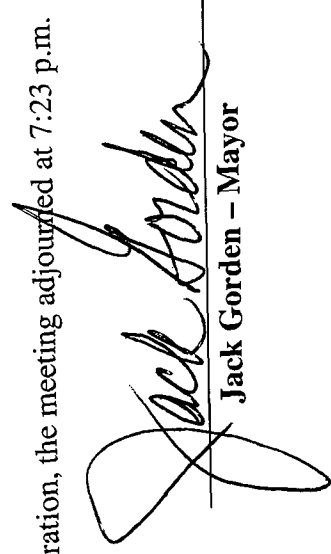
14. CALENDAR NOTATIONS FROM MAYOR, COUNCIL MEMBERS, AND CITY MANAGER

Mayor Jack Gorden reminded the Council about the upcoming ribbon cutting for Loving Toyota which would be held on Wednesday, June 6, 2007 at 12:00 noon. Mayor Gorden added that the Concerned Black Men would meet at the City Hall Room 202 on Wednesday, June 6, 2007 at 5:30 p.m. Mayor Gorden stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission would meet on Monday, June 11, 2007 at 5:00 p.m. at City Hall Room 102 (Council Chambers). Mayor Gorden added that there would be a meeting of the Lufkin Community Development on Monday, June 11, 2007 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall Room 202. Mayor Gorden stated that the Annual National Flag Day Celebration would be held on Thursday, June 14, 2007 at 5:30 p.m. at the City Hall Atrium. Mayor Gorden added that the 40th Anniversary of the Ellen Trout Zoo would be celebrated on Saturday, June 16, 2007 from 12:00 Noon to 5:00 p.m. and encouraged everyone to attend. City Manager Paul Parker reminded the Council that Nacogdoches would be hosting the TML Region 16 Meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 7, 2007 at the Fredonia Hotel.

Mayor Gorden stated that the City of Lufkin received a "thank you" note from the City of Nacogdoches Fire Department for sending firemen to help man their stations during a funeral for a Captain.
